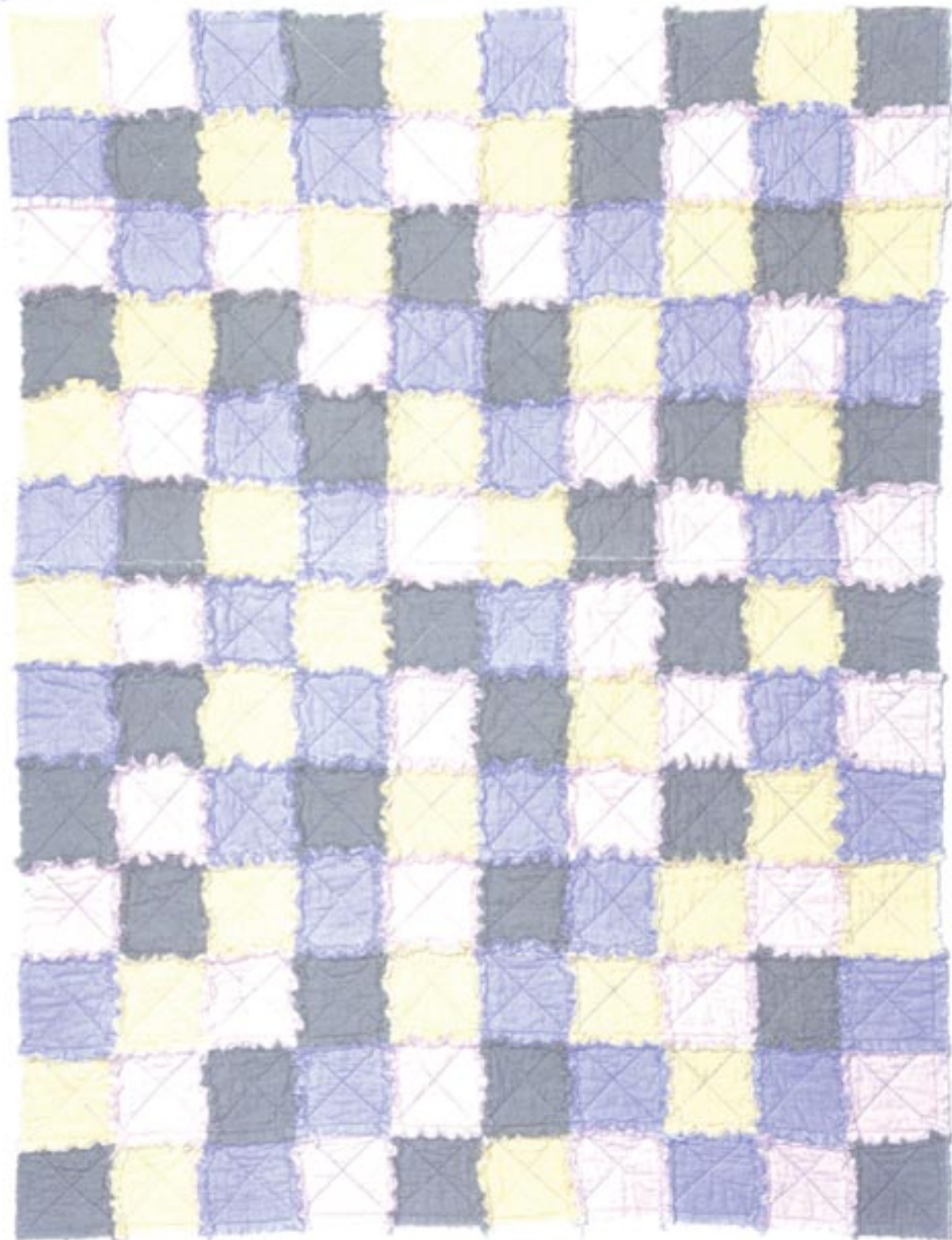


# Cuddle Quilt

# Cuddle Quilt

Finished size 40" X 52"

## Supplies:

*Do Not Prewash Fabrics or Batting*

Marcus Brothers Super Flannel

You will need 1 1/2 yards of four colors  
(or yardage to total 6 yards)

Batting-Natural Cotton® 45" X 60"

Regular Sewing Thread

90/14 Sewing Needle

A "walking" or "even feed" foot

(This will make sewing this quilt together much more enjoyable. These feet work like an extra pair of feed dogs and move the fabric through the machine without any "pleating")

## Cutting Directions:

### Batting:

Cut one hundred and thirty 4" squares

### Flannels:

Cut sixty-six 5" squares of each color

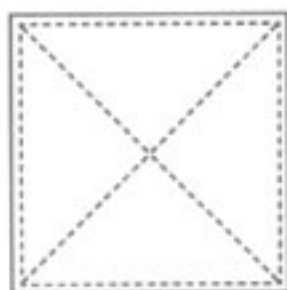
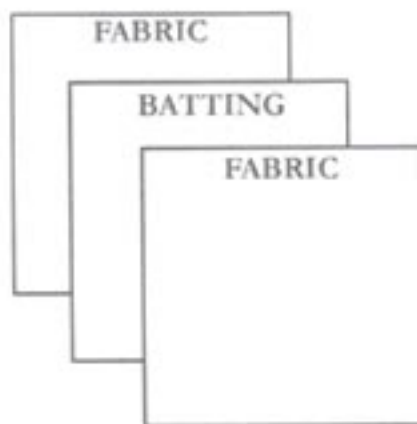
## Piecing Directions:

*Use 1/2" seam allowances for piecing.*

## Blocks:

Layer a 5" square of one fabric  
(wrong side up), a 4" square of batting and a  
5" square of the same fabric (right side up):

Sew, using a  
1/2" seam  
allowance, all  
around the  
outside of the  
"quilt sandwich".



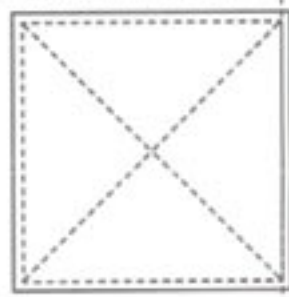
Top stitch an "X" over the block:

You may have to use less stitches per inch- you can experiment with your machine. Make thirty-three quilt sandwiches of each

color this way. Lay out your blocks in a pattern that is appealing to you. You will need 13 rows of 10 squares each. Place the backs of one color and another color quilt sandwich together and sew, using your 1/2" seam allowance. Press all

seam allowances open and pin them in place until you sew the next seam. Make sure that the raw edges of the sewn seam are on the front of the quilt. Continue to add quilt sandwiches to form

rows in the order you had laid out.



Sew the rows together to complete the top. Be sure to keep all of the seam allowances facing toward the front of the quilt.

Begin to cut through the seam allowances to make the fringe, about every 1/2". Be careful not to cut through the sewn seam. It is helpful to begin the cutting process with the last-sewn seam. Wash the quilt (we highly recommend a commercial machine for the first washing--it will be VERY fuzzy and that can create havoc with your septic system!) You may have a few long threads to trim after the first wash. Once the quilt is "shaggy" you can wash it like any other.
